

Translating the New Clothing-Care Labels

here's a new laundry language coming your way. To make care labels more consistent with those in Canada and Mexico, many U.S. clothing manufacturers are adopting a system of symbols to tell you how to wash, bleach, dry, and iron your clothes. Explanatory phrases will accompany the icons during an 18-month transition period that begins in July, but after that, manufacturers are free to drop the phrases. Avoid confusion in your household by posting this chart next to the washing machine:
